

Comforted and Challenged in the Manger.

In 1994 two American teachers, invited to Russia to teach religion, told the traditional story of Christmas to a group of orphans. The children then were invited to make a manger and the baby from pieces of cardboard and felt. One little boy had two babies in the manger : one of them was Jesus, and he himself was the other. When asked why, the boy related the Christmas story with a new ending : Jesus invited him to stay in the manger too—for always— since the boy didn't have a family. He said his gift to Jesus was to help keep him warm in the manger. On this day of gift giving and receiving, that boy's story invites us to reflect on two of Christmas's messages: the things in our lives are minimal compared to who is in our lives; and the best gifts we can give are those that come from who we are, from our very lives.
